MINUTES:

Commissioner See moved to approve the minutes from the regular meeting that was held on December 16, 2021, as submitted. All yes – Motion passed unanimously

REPORTS:

Randolph County Deputy Sheriff, Rocky Hebb appeared before the Commission. He discussed the PRO Grant they have with the Board of Education. He said it is a huge asset for Randolph County. He said it is built to be pro- active for students to look at the deputies as good guys. He said Deputy Pennington is doing a great Job. He said Deputy Pennington and himself take the calls for the abuse cases that come through the school system. He said it is the first year in Randolph County and he hopes it continues for many years to come. Commissioner See said it sounds like a really good program. Sheriff Elbon said they applied for a grant for this and it took the Governor a while to sign off on it. He said they need a resolution signed today to be sent in for the grant. He said the Board of Education pays the two deputies salaries. He said they need this resolution signed so the grant money can be sent to them. Commissioner Kesling read the resolution out loud. (See copy attached) Commissioner See moved to approve the resolution, as submitted. All yes — Motion passed unanimously

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION/ ACTION:

INFORMATIONAL PRESENTATION FROM COUNTRY ROADS TRANSIT

Laura Ward appeared before the Commission. She said she was there to give a yearly report on how Country Roads Transit has been doing. She said this program runs on a 50/50 match. She said they have to raise 50% to get 50%. She said the lack of transportation can be a life altering, health altering problem. She said last year they gave a total of 11,825 rides in Randolph County in 2021. She said that total number of riders is down from previous years because of COVID. She said they did not miss one single day because of COVID. She said the bus driver's did not complain one time. She said they hope to get back to normal and it seems like so far this year they are going to. She said last year she came to them and talked about a Veterans Route to the Clarksburg area. She said it is a two day a week service. She said they asked for \$5,000,00 additional dollars but not one single entity gave it. She said they made it work anyway and started it in May 2021. She said they would like to request an additional \$5,000.00 this year for the Clarksburg route. Commissioner Kesling asked if they would be able to take people to the pool/splash pad once they get it open? Ms. Ward said yes they can make that happen. She said they can talk later about it but they did something similar in Upshur County. Commissioner Kesling said they will give them the \$5,000.00 that they didn't get last year and when they do the budget will look and see if they can give them the \$5,000.00 additional this year. Commissioner See moved to approve a funding request from Country Roads Transit in the amount of \$5,000.00 and that is to be taken out of courthouse contractual funds. All yes - Motion passed unanimously

Commissioner Chris Siler joined the meeting at this time.

Lynn Phillips from Governor Jim Justice's Office was present. He said the Governor wishes everyone well here and he says the State is in good financial shape and he is working on getting a fourth COVID shot

for the State of West Virginia. He just reported yesterday that West Virginia finished in the top 10 for the best tourist States in the nation.

Commissioner Kesling said hats off to the maintenance men here at the courthouse for keeping the sidewalks and parking lots cleared off during this snow storm. He said they are doing an excellent job with it.

Commissioner Siler said in 25 years of service that he did they all pretty much knew throughout each County that your longevity goes along as you are paying for their experience and their time. He said he has never seen it where it has never been done. Commissioner Siler moved to approve the longevity pay adjustments for Deputy Rocky Hebb and Deputy Dave Vanmeter, as submitted.

He said all of the other issues are kinda in the back seat to that. He said if the current personal representative gets removed then whoever gets appointed would have the same problems. He said the recommendation is for Mr. Armstrong to have 90 days from today to get an appraisal done and decide if he can purchase the property or not. IRS issues standard mileage rates for 2022

IR-2021-251, December 17, 2021

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today issued the 2022 optional standard mileage rates used to calculate the deductible costs of operating an automobile for business, charitable, medical or moving purposes.

Beginning on January 1, 2022, the standard mileage rates for the use of a car (also vans, pickups or panel trucks) will be:

- 58.5 cents per mile driven for business use, up 2.5 cents from the rate for 2021,
- 18 cents per mile driven for medical, or moving purposes for qualified active-duty members of the Armed Forces, up 2 cents from the rate for 2021 and
- 14 cents per mile driven in service of charitable organizations; the rate is set by statute and remains unchanged from 2021.

The standard mileage rate for business use is based on an annual study of the fixed and variable costs of operating an automobile. The rate for medical and moving purposes is based on the variable costs.

It is important to note that under the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, taxpayers cannot claim a miscellaneous itemized deduction for unrelimbursed employee travel expenses. Taxpayers also cannot claim a deduction for moving expenses, unless they are members of the Armed Forces on active duty moving under orders to a permanent change of station. For more details see Moving Expenses for Members of the Armed Forces.

Taxpayers always have the option of calculating the actual costs of using their vehicle rather than using the standard mileage rates.

Taxpayers can use the standard mileage rate but must opt to use it in the first year the car is available for business use. Then, in later years, they can choose either the standard mileage rate or actual expenses. Leased vehicles must use the standard mileage rate method for the entire lease period (including renewals) if the standard mileage rate is chosen.

Notice 22-03 [PDF], contains the optional 2022 standard mileage rates, as well as the maximum automobile cost used to calculate the allowance under a fixed and variable rate (FAVR) plan. In addition, the notice provides the maximum fair market value of employer-provided automobiles first made available to employees for personal use in calendar year 2022 for which employers may use the fleet-average valuation rule in or the vehicle cents-per-mile valuation rule.

Deputy Sheriff Rocky Hebb served with the Upshur County Sheriff's Office as a Deputy Sheriff from September of 2009 through December of 2019.
